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When Armenia and the Diaspora join forces, the sky is the limit



MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Whenever Armenia and the Diaspora come together, driven by trust, respect, and mutual understanding, they can create magic. This is what took place 23 years ago, when we combined our forces together, in equal partnership, and created the Armenian Bone Marrow Donor Registry.

Recently, the spirit of Armenia-Diaspora collaboration was once again at work, and became even more palpable, in the research that was conducted by ABMDR and a team of Armenian scientists. Through our research, we played a humble role in understanding the role of HLA

molecules in the regulation of the body's response to COVID-19, thereby contributing to the global scientific community's knowledge of the virus. This is a very prestigious achievement for Armenia (please see page 6 for further details).

Indeed, achieving great things through collaboration is exactly what transpired in the course of the COVID-19 pandemic, as extreme hardship also served to underscore the pan-Armenian nature of ABMDR. It was thanks to a singular spirit of partnership between Homeland and Diaspora that ABMDR was able to not only provide support to all of our cancer patients, but to forge ahead with our operations, and, as importantly, to conduct a significant research.

During the pandemic, cancer patients suffered the most. Because of their alreadycompromised immune systems, they became more isolated. However, the demand for finding a match did not stop and we did not stop our operations, despite all the hurdles brought on by COVID-19. During this period, we continued to receive many referrals for patients and did our utmost to help them. In fact, we facilitated our 37th and 38th stem cell harvesting procedures in 2021 and early 2022, for patients in Canada and France. We collected stem cells from our donors in Yerevan, and, despite all the pandemic-related travel restrictions, were able to deliver the harvested stem cells to Europe, thus saving two more precious lives.

Through our research, we were able to bridge the knowledge and expertise of the Diaspora with those of the Homeland to once again create a unique project. Today, we salute all of our partners and sponsors, who believed in us and helped us deliver groundbreaking research during the pandemic, research whose findings were published in one of the world's top medical journals.

Ask the Doctor: an interview with ABMDR Executive Director Dr. Sevak Avagyan



Q: First, congratulations for continuing to carry out all of ABMDR's daily functions through more than two grueling years of COVID-19. But also, congratulations on the publication of your research studies on COVID and HLA.

A. Thank you. This was a massive effort on the part of so many of us under very trying conditions, but we are very happy that all this work paid off. Our paper just got published in *Frontiers in Immunology*, a very prestigious scientific journal, and is generating a great deal of interest in the medical and scientific communities internationally.

Q. Briefly, what was the main point of this research project?

A. The main focus was to explore the possibility that some specific HLA types would make people more susceptible to severe symptoms, and/or that some HLA genes would protect people from severe disease.

Q. Did you find either?

A. Actually, we found both. We discovered that a specific gene (HLA-C*04:01) makes individuals who carry that gene far more likely to get moderate or severe symptoms of COVID-19 than those who do not carry that version of the gene. We also discovered that another gene (HLA-B*51:01) to some degree protects individuals who carry it from symptomatic disease.

Q. That's amazing! Why did you even think that there might be a connection between COVID and specific HLA types?

A. It's well established that many factors — including age, general health, and medical history of infected individuals — have a big impact on how severe the disease will be. But regarding HLA and COVID: we know that the HLA proteins, which are determined by HLA genes, play a key role in alerting and waking up the immune system against infectious particles, including viruses. HLA proteins are constantly patrolling the body to find foreign particles. They bind to these particles and present them to the immune system, which then mounts a war against the invading infection. Specific HLA proteins, being slightly different from each other, may have a higher or lower ability to recognize specific viral particles, and may therefore elicit a stronger or weaker immune response to an infection. That was the scientific basis, the starting point of our study.

Q. That's fascinating. Clearly, scientifically very important. Any immediate practical implications?

A. It helps us understand the role of genetics in why some are more susceptible to COVID than others. But another important point to note is that HLA-C*04:01 is very prevalent among Armenians. This knowledge should give the public and health providers yet another science-based fact, and allow individuals to take it into account in assessing their own risk, and making their choice to get vaccinated or not accordingly.

ABMDR performs its 37th and 38th harvesting procedures, to help save the lives of patients in Canada and France

On December 13, 2021, a Yerevan resident donated bone marrow stem cells to help save the life of a patient in Canada. The donor was identified by ABMDR as a perfect bone marrow match for the patient, who suffered from leukemia.

The harvesting of the donor's bone marrow stem cells was performed in the Armenian capital, with the intention of using them for an urgent transplant that could potentially save the patient's life.

The painless, non-invasive harvesting of the donor's stem cells was the 37th such procedure in ABMDR's history. As soon as the harvesting was completed, the cells were flown to Canada with the help of a special courier. Present at the harvesting procedure were AB-MDR Executive Director Dr. Sevak Avagyan and ABMDR Medical Director Dr. Mihran Nazaretyan, among other lab-staff members.

Commenting on the process of harvesting a donor's stem cells and delivering them for a life-saving transplant, Dr. Sevak Avagyan said, "Every link in the chain of medical professionals who relay the hope of life from hand to hand, from country to country, must work smoothly. This is when all borders are opened, people forget their nationality, and pursue a single goal: to deliver the precious donated stem cells as soon as possible for a chance to safe the life of a patient."

On January 17, 2022, another Yerevan resident donated bone marrow stem cells to help save the life of an ethnic-Armenian patient who lives in France. The harvesting of the donor's bone marrow stem cells, likewise performed in Yerevan, was ABMDR's 38th, and the first in the history of the organization to benefit an Armenian patient living in France. The donor wished to remain anonymous.

"We are extremely grateful to our donor," said ABMDR President Dr. Frieda Jordan following the harvesting and continued: "Once the donor was identified as a perfect match for the patient in France, he stepped forward without a moment's hesitation and went on to donate his bone marrow stem cells. This process — of a registered donor being identified as a match and immediately donating bone marrow stem cells to help save someone's life — is the very essence of our mission."

Team-member spotlight: Dr. Hayk Davtyan




Dr. Hayk Davtyan is an Associate Research Professor at the Institute for Memory Impairments and Neurological Disorders at the University of California, Irvine. He came to the US in 2006 with a wealth of experience and educational credentials. He graduated from Yerevan State University in 2001 with an MS in Biophysics, and, in 2004, was awarded a PhD in Molecular Biology. Dr. Davtyan started his collaboration with ABMDR's Tissue-Typing Laboratory in 2001. Within a short time, he became a key person in the laboratory, and, consequently, was given a unique opportunity in 2002 to participate in a training session at Foundation Laboratory in Glendora, California. Three years later, thanks in considerable part to Dr. Davtyan's efforts and success, ABMDR's HLA-typing Laboratory received accreditation from the European Federation for Immunogenetics. During 2006-2016, Dr. Davtyan completed a Postdoctoral Fellowship, followed by employment as an Associate Scientist at the Institute for Molecular Medicine, Department of Immunology. In 2017, he joined the Stem Cell Research Center at UC Irvine, where he continues his work today. A major focus of Dr. Davtyan's research centers around the neuroimmunology of Alzheimer's Disease and related neurodegenerative disorders. Dr. Davtyan has co-authored more than 45 peer-reviewed publications, and his work has been presented at some of the most highly recognized international conferences in the field.



ABMDR's landmark research findings on how COVID-19 affects Armenians published in leading medical journal

An article containing the findings of a major COVID-19 research conducted by ABMDR has been published in *Frontiers in Immunology*, one of the world's leading medical journals. The results of the landmark research, which was conducted by ABMDR in collaboration with various Armenian scientists, pertain to the specific manners in which the COVID-19 virus affects ethnic Armenians. The article was published in the February 3, 2022 issue of *Frontiers in Immunology*.

A preeminent journal in its field, *Frontiers in Immunology* publishes rigorously peer-reviewed research across basic, translational, and clinical immunology. *Frontiers in Immunology* is the official journal of the International Union of Immunological Societies (IUIS).

Commenting on the publication of the ABMDR article, Dr. Frieda Jordan, president of the organization, stated, "I think this is a historic milestone, as the results of a critically-important and timely research conducted by a team of Armenian scientists is being shared with the global medical community, contributing to a better understanding of a devastating pandemic."

The ABMDR article, published in the "Viral Immunology" section of *Frontiers in Immunology*, was co-authored by Dr. Anahit Hovhannisyan, Dr. Vergine Madelian, Dr. Sevak Avagyan, Dr. Mihran Nazaretyan, Armine Hyussyan, Alina Sirunyan, Rubina Arakelyan, Zorayr Manukyan, Levon Yepiskoposyan, Karine Mayilyan, and Dr. Frieda Jordan.

ABMDR's COVID-19 research was made possible through the collaboration of the Ministry of Health of the Republic of Armenia; Institute of Molecular Biology, National Academy of Sciences, Yerevan; Yerevan State Medical University; Russian-Armenian University, Yerevan; ClinSoft Armenia, Yerevan; ClinStat Group, Lexington, Massachusetts; and HistoGenetics, New York, which donated all testing required for the research. The project was funded in part by Dr. Carolann and George Najarian and the Armenian American Medical Society.

What the ABMDR research revealed

At the onset of the pandemic in Armenia, ABMDR embarked on a research study to investigate the correlation between COVID-19 and HLA molecules (human Leukocyte antigens). The rationale of the study was that some COVID-19 patients suffer rather mild or even no symptoms (asymptomatic), while others develop severe conditions requiring hospitalization and might die.

Many factors can influence immune response to the infection, such as age, pre-exciting medical conditions, and environmental factors. The ABMDR research primarily focused

Since January 2022, Anahit has been a researcher at the School of Genetics and Microbiology, Trinity College Dublin, Ireland. Her research project is focused on studying the population history and genetic makeup of Armenians, utilizing data on ancient DNA from archaeological specimens from the region, in conjunction with modern Armenian genomes. With this conjoint approach, she and her colleagues will be able to solve a range of longstanding evolutionary questions.


on the role of HLA genetic factors in the severity of the disease. It is well known that HLA molecules play a vital role in the development and regulation of the immune system and its response to viral particles. HLA molecules bind to peptides derived from the virus and present them to the body's defense cells, hence triggering an adaptive immune response against the invader, such as the COVID-19 virus.


In our research, we asked two core questions: are there any specific HLA molecules that provide susceptibility to the disease, and are there any HLA molecules that provide protection against it? We subsequently assembled a large number of COVID patients for our study and divided them into three groups, each representing a specific clinical status: asymptomatic, mild, and severe. We tested all patients for their HLA type.

Results of our study indicated that patients who carried the HLA-C*04:01 gene ended up with mild or severe disease, while those who did not carry this gene were asymptomatic. Moreover, our study indicated that patients who carried the


gene HLA-B*51:01 were somewhat protected against symptomatic COVID-19. These results point to the significant role of HLA genetic variation in the development of a specific immune response to COVID-19. Our research findings represent a high degree of clinical relevance as we have established that in a sample population of 5,579 Armenians, a very high percentage of patients (2,200) carries the HLA-C*04:01 gene and is therefore at a higher risk of getting moderate to severe symptoms of COVID-19. Going forward, testing for HLA alleles will strengthen the strategic clinical management of the disease and assist the educational and outreach efforts of Armenia's health authorities in the implementation of systemic responses, including vaccination programs.





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YOUTH POWER: A NEW GENERATION OF ABMDR VOLUNTEERS

Anita Petrosyan



Honoring those who perished fighting for their homeland, including ABMDR donors dedicated to saving lives

In May 2021, ABMDR took part in a national commemoration in honor of the thousands of soldiers who fell in the First and Second Artsakh Wars, including 94 young men who had joined the ranks of ABMDR.

The commemoration took place in Yerevan on May 9, the traditional date that marks Shushi Liberation Day. Every year on May 8 and May 9 and up till 2020, Armenians celebrated the liberation of Shushi and the liberation of Artsakh as a whole. In 2021, however, as the Armenian nation was reeling from the loss of Shushi and other territories, May 9 has instead become a day of remembrance and mourning.

On the morning of May 9, hundreds marched from the center of Yerevan to the Yerablur Military Cemetery. The procession culminated in a solemn commemoration at Yerablur. Event participants included the staff of the ABMDR Laboratory in Yerevan, led by ABMDR Medical Director Dr. Mihran Nazaretyan, and numerous ABMDR volunteers, supporters, and registered donors.

"We mourn the devastating loss of human life caused by the Artsakh War of 2020," said ABMDR President Dr. Frieda Jordan. "We also grieve the inconsolable loss of the 94 soldiers who had joined ABMDR. These young men are heroes for not only having fought for their homeland, but seeking to help save lives by donating their stem cells to patients in need of transplants."



Despite the ongoing challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, ABMDR made considerable strides throughout 2021 and the early part of 2022, in terms of not only continued tissue-typing, but also community outreach and recruitments. In Los Angeles, delegations of our Board met with Archbishop Hovnan Derderian of the Western Diocese and Bishop Torkom Donoyan of the Western Prelacy, continuing to build on our bond with the Armenian church. Both the Diocese and the Prelacy held special prayer days for patients and families of ABMDR, while the Prelacy prayer day, held at Holy Cross Cathedral in Montebello, functioned as a donorrecruitment event as well. In addition, our 16th annual Walk of Life functioned as a major recruitment event, and we held three recruitments specifically for one of our patients - at Christ Armenian Church, in La Crescenta; Holy Trinity Armenian Evangelical Church, in Glendale; and Armenian Cilicia Evangelical Church, in Pasadena. As importantly, we rigorously continued our tissue-typing operations, while three donors, Vazrik, Selina, and an anonymous donor, were identified as potential matches for patients whose last hope of survival was to have a stem cell transplant. Thank you, our wonderful donors, for providing additional swab and blood samples for higher-resolution typing. You are all our heroes!


