That we achieved all this against all odds is a testament to our ABMDR community: our dedicated lab staff that worked day and night under extremely trying conditions, and our staunch supporters whose generosity sustained our day-to-day operations, and also encouraged our timely research project. Thank you! But 2020 had one more disaster in store for us. The Artsakh war put our nation through a terrible tragedy. We lost so many precious young lives, many from among our very own donors. Our heartbreak is deep, but our resolve is deeper and stronger. Let us start this year with even more tenacity and determination. Let's honor our fallen heroes by helping our patients. Let's work together and keep saving precious lives.

### Ask the Doctor: an interview with ABMDR Executive Director Dr. Sevak Avagyan



Q: This has been the year when COV-ID-19 paralyzed the world and stopped everyone and everything in its tracks. How was ABMDR affected?

A: Like most countries, Armenia was hit hard by COVID-19. We lost many citizens to the disease, people had to isolate in place, only essential personnel were allowed out for essential business. The country was shut down. But cancer doesn't stop for pandemics. So except for large-scale recruitments, our operations continued. We were as busy as ever.

Q: What kept the lab busy?

A: We continued to receive and process requests for patients in need of transplants from around the world. We processed a total of 6,000 such requests and 200 follow-up requests. Twenty of the patients were from Armenia. Q: Did you find matches for any of these patients?

A: Yes, we did. In fact, under extremely difficult conditions, we harvested stem cells for three patients, all of them Armenian patients being treated in Germany. With the help of Armenia's Ministry of Health, and in spite of severe travel restrictions in Armenia and all over Europe, we managed to get all the proper documents to have special couriers fly the harvested cells to Germany for transplantation into these three patients. We are extremely proud of our team. These harvests, two in 2020, and one in early 2021, meant that three of our patients got a second chance at life.

Q: Three transplants in the year of a pandemic! That's truly remarkable. But I'm sure the lab staff was also occupied with other tasks.

A: Yes, indeed. We continued to perform all the diagnostic tests used to dictate the best course of treatment for patients, such as immunophenotyping and HLA disease association, and we performed all the matching for the kidney-transplant center in Armenia. We also processed and banked over 40 cord blood samples.

Q: That is very impressive. So while COVID-19 was certainly a great challenge, it didn't slow you down.

A: No, it didn't. In fact, in addition to our regular lab work, we undertook an investigation to study the relationship between HLA and COVID-19. We expand on this project in this issue's "Major Milestones" section (pages 6-7). Q: We also know that the last few months of 2020 were consumed by the Artsakh war. What was that like?

A: That has been a devastating shock to the country. The loss of life and land was immeasurable, a heavy blow to the entire nation. Among the thousands of soldiers who lost their lives, many were from the ranks of our donors. They were family. We mourn them all, but vow to honor them by fighting even harder to save every life we can.



### NEWS FROM THE LAB: OUR 36TH HARVESTING

## Yerevan resident donates stem cells to help save life of Armenian patient in Germany

Despite unprecedented challenges brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic, ABMDR facilitated a life-saving stem cell-harvesting procedure. On January 11, a Yerevan resident, a young man who is a registered donor with ABMDR, donated bone marrow stem cells to help save the life of an Armenian cancer patient undergoing treatment in Germany. The Yerevan resident was identified as a perfect stem cell donor match for the recipient patient, who suffers from a life-threatening illness and whose last hope of survival is a stem cell transplant.

The painless, non-invasive harvesting of cells from the donor, the 36th such procedure to be performed by ABMDR, took place in Yerevan. As soon as the harvesting was completed, the donated cells were flown to Germany with the help of a special courier, Nico Keiser. Present at the harvesting procedure in Yerevan were ABMDR Executive Director Dr. Sevak Avagyan and ABMDR Medical Director Dr. Mihran Nazaretyan, among other lab-staff members.

"All of us at ABMDR are delighted for having been able to facilitate our 36th harvesting procedure," said ABMDR President Dr. Frieda Jordan and added, "Today, I'm proud to say that thanks to our wonderful volunteers, staff members, and supporters, ABMDR continues to stand with our patients and communities across the world."

Dr. Jordan also stated that although the COVID-19 pandemic has severely impacted ABMDR, the organization continues to conduct donor-search requests and tissue-typing for its patients, and continues to provide them with support and counseling remotely.

### ABMDR CONDUCTS GROUNDBREAKING COVID-19 RESEARCH

At ABMDR, we tissue-type every donor we register. The tissue type of each individual is determined by the combination of Human Leukocyte Antigens (HLA), which, in turn, is determined by our genetics. These proteins have to be matched between donors and recipients in order for transplants to succeed.

In addition to being critical in the successful outcome of transplants, HLA antigens play a key role in our immune response to invading bacteria and viruses. HLA molecules recognize and bind parts of these infectious agents, and present them to our immune system, which then is prompted to mount a defense and fight off these particular invaders. The specific HLA profile of a person often determines if this immune response is weak or strong, and thus determines the progress and severity of the disease.

When SARS-CoV-2 took the world by storm, ABMDR immediately developed a research project to determine if there are specific HLA profiles that would make COVID-19 patients more or less susceptible to severe disease. With this in mind, we studied a group of 300 COVID-19 patients in Armenia, grouped according to the severity of their disease (severe, mild to moderate, asymptomatic). We determined the HLA profiles of these patients, and are in the process of analyzing our data. The idea is to find specific HLA types that may either make patients more susceptible to severe disease, or others that may protect the individual from severe disease.

Our study will advance our basic understanding of the COVID-19 disease. It could be used to identify genetically high-risk individuals and help in the clinical management of the disease.

This study was conceived, developed, and conducted by our ABMDR team in the US (Drs. Frieda Jordan and Vergine Madelian) and Armenia (Drs. Sevak Avagyan and Mihran Nazaretyan, Armine Hyusyan, Alina Sirunyan, Ani Azaryan, and Dr. Tatshat Asaturyan).

But our work would not have been possible without our wonderful collaborators, skilled experts in their own fields:

Anahit Hovhannisyan, PhD, is a researcher at the Laboratory of Ethnogenomics, Institute of Molecular Biology, National Academy of Sciences of Armenia. She has a doctoral degree in Genetics, and is presently a visiting post-doctoral fellow at the Evolutionary Ecology Group, Department of Zoology, University of Cambridge, UK.

Rubina Arakelyan, MA, is a data analyst at Clinsoft LLC, with wide experience in all aspects of statistical modeling and analysis. She has a master's degree in economics with a major in modern data analysis,

### VIRTUAL WALK OF LIFE, COAST TO COAST



In 2020, the ABMDR Walk of Life adapted to the circumstances of the COVID-19 pandemic by going virtual. Instead of having stand-alone events in Los Angeles and Boston, we invited our community and supporters from around the globe to participate in a virtual walk that lasted throughout the month of October.
